#### **Vice-Chair Opening Remarks**

#### **Ms. Constance Snavely**

As a member of the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery Memorial Council, I want to take a moment to discuss the Avenue of Flags and the continual need for casket flags. Indiantown Gap National Cemetery received special dispensation to fly casket flags along the roads in the cemetery, which is known as the Avenue of Flags. The flags are posted prior to Memorial Day and retrieved after Veterans Day. There are groups of volunteers that inspect the flags on a weekly basis and replace worn or faded flags. These flags were donated by families whose loved one had the flag draped over their coffin or folded by their urn. There is a continual need for flags as the cotton flags do not hold up well in the elements. Previously there were close to 700 flags flying in the cemetery. Now there are only approximately 300 due to a dwindling stockpile. If the family would like to personally post their donated flag near their loved ones' grave, that can be arranged. After a flag is no longer serviceable, the flag is properly retired on site and the ashes spread on the cemetery grounds. I encourage you to spread the word throughout your organizations of the continual need for casket flags. I've been able to rescue several good flags from retirement at my church sponsored Cub Scout's annual flag retirement. Families that donate flags will receive a letter of appreciation from the Indiantown Gap National Cemetery. Flags may be dropped off in a collection box at the Cemetery Administration office or at the Memorial Day or Veterans Day ceremony. If those options are not feasible, you can collect them and bring them to the SVC meeting, and I will deliver them to the cemetery. I have pamphlets available on the program. Thank you




#### We build relationships that amplify service to the SMVF community




# Amputee & Paralyzed Veterans' Pension




## SFY24 Budget: \$4,173,000




# Blind Veterans' Pension




# **Educational Gratuity**




# Veterans' Temporary Assistance




## SFY24 VTF Allowance: \$900,000






# Disabled Vets' Real Estate Tax Exemption

# Improvements to the Access to Care website

Average wait times for all VHA medical centers and clinics are now calculated to include additional steps in the appointment process that had not been captured in the past.

- For <u>new patient</u> appointments, average wait time is calculated from the earliest time a
  request for care is consistently recorded in the scheduling system to the date the
  appointment is completed or the date it is scheduled to occur if not yet completed.
- For <u>established patient</u> appointments, average wait times are measured from the date agreed upon between a Veteran and provider for future care and ends on the date care is received, or the date that care is scheduled to occur if it has not yet occurred.

The upgraded calculation makes the website more reflective of the complete process of requesting and receiving care. Averages are representative of general performance and may not represent individual experience. Average wait times are never used to determine eligibility for community care.



## **Leadership Update**

## **Patient Experience Update- Trust**

VISN 4 has consistently received the highest trust score in the nation at 94.7%. Our network also has the highest number of compliments at 79.2% and the lowest number of concerns at 11.1%. The top 5 compliments recently are interactions with staff, cleanliness of facility, quality of care, satisfaction with specialty care, and Appointment Check in process.

## **Statewide Rollout of Community Nurse Liaison Program**

On September 13<sup>th</sup> I signed a memorandum of understanding (MOU) with UPMC implementing a Community Nurse Liaison program at eight UPMC hospitals. The Program enhances and expands VISN 4's collaboration with UPMC, providing a seamless transition of care for veterans after an inpatient stay by coordinating discharges, identifying veterans who are not in the VA system, and enrolling new veterans into VA health care.

The Community Nurse Liaison Program model consists of embedding VA registered nurses into eight UPMC hospitals -- UPMC Presbyterian, UPMC Montefiore, and UPMC Passavant in Pittsburgh, UPMC Hamot in Erie, UPMC Harrisburg, UPMC Community Osteopathic in Harrisburg, UPMC West Shore in Mechanicsburg, and UPMC Altoona -- to streamline the care of veterans from admission to discharge. Coordinating continued care, including physical therapy, prescriptions, and follow-up appointments by working hand in hand with the community case managers, is also part of the community nurse liaison's role. Through the program, the UPMC hospitals will work closely with their local VA Medical Centers -- Pittsburgh VA Medical Center, Butler VA Medical Center, Erie VA Medical Center, Altoona VA Medical Center, and Lebanon VA Medical Center.

The new MOU builds upon the already successful Community Nurse Liaison Program between UPMC and VISN 4 that was initiated in August 2022 with UPMC Harrisburg, UPMC West Shore, and UPMC Community Osteopathic — a program that was one of the first of its kind. Over the past two years, positive outcomes of the program include the ability to identify veterans who present to a non-VA hospital on the same day/next business day, increased number of inpatient transfers to VA inpatient units, repatriation into VA post-discharge, decreased length of stay, improved trust in VA (both veterans and community providers), improved collaboration with patient aligned care teams, social work, and U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development-Veterans Affairs Supportive Housing, coordination and integrated case management, and an increase in VA enrollment.

## **Connected Care Update**

My VA Images: The VA Connected Care program offers Veterans many tools to support their care from home. My VA Images (MVAI) allows providers to request photos and videos directly from their patients to assist in their care. The app will guide patients through taking the required photos and/or videos and remind them when the images are due. It is a secure web-application that will protect patient information from upload through submission. Patients can use a smart mobile device or personal computer, avoid travel, and wait times while receiving expert health care for specified needs from anywhere, anytime.

MHV Sign-In Transition Update: Beginning September 19, 2024, the "Registration" and "Sign in" buttons will be replaced with a single "Sign in or create an account" button on My Health eVet's home page.

- Veterans will no longer be able to create a My Health eVet (MHV) account with a MHV user ID and password. Instead, new My Health eVet accounts will be created using a modern (identity verified + multifactor authentication ID.me or Login.gov) account.
- New My Health eVet accounts will not have a MHV User ID and password.
- Veterans with an existing My Health eVet user ID and password will be able to continue using this sign in method through January 31, 2025.
- Veterans who already have a MHV user ID and password obtained before September 19, 2024, will be able to be in-person identity verified and their accounts upgraded to Premium through January 31, 2025.
- The new "Sign in or create an account" page will allow users to sign in using the same method they currently sign in to My Health eVet.

## **HRO Highlight: Wilkes-Barre VAMC**

One of the 5 HRO Principles is "Preoccupation with Failure," was demonstrated by the care coordinator nurse monitoring a Veteran's blood pressure which was low resulted in the at the Wilkes-Barre VAMC.

Mary Smyth, RN, RPM-HT Care Coordinator was covering for another care coordinator and called a Veteran for a Blood Pressure (BP) of 90/48. The Veteran's wife answered the call and stated the Veteran was sleeping after she gave him a dose of Midodrine to increase his BP. Ms. Smyth demonstrated reluctance to simplify and asked the wife if she could take his BP while on the phone. The Veteran's BP was 86/49 and his wife stated the Veteran was very drowsy and weak.

Being sensitive to operations, Ms. Smyth asked the wife to additionally take the Veteran's pulse oxygen. Veteran's pulse oxygen turned out to be 79%, HR 48 with his oxygen on. Ms. Smyth reviewed signs and symptoms of hypoxia and confirmed with his wife that the Veteran had bluish lips and nail beds. The Veteran's wife also indicated he was able to speak, but very weak. Ms. Smyth deferred to her nursing expertise and advised the wife to call 911 immediately as it was an emergency and critical. The Veteran's wife agreed to call and hung up with Ms. Smyth. Ms. Smyth called the Veteran's wife back to check on the Veteran's status. Emergency responders were in the home and preparing to take the Veteran to the hospital.

The Veteran's wife was extremely thankful for the call and for Ms. Smyth's preoccupation with failure. The wife stated that if Ms. Smyth did not call, she would have left the Veteran continue sleeping and would not have known about his low BP oxygen levels. The Veteran was admitted to the hospital and because of Ms. Smyth's actions avoided a potentially adverse outcome.

## **New Steps to Prevent Fraud Against Veterans, Service Members and Families**

On August 9, 2024, the VA announced the <u>launch of VSAFE.gov and 1-833-38V-SAFE</u> (1-833-388-7233) — a new government-wide website and call center designed to protect Veterans, service members, and their families from fraud and scams.

These new resources will help inform Veterans and their families of common fraud schemes, give them tools to protect themselves, and provide an outlet for reporting and further assistance.

On August 9, 2024, VBA also launched the Claims Predators Fraud Prevention Communication Campaign.

VBA defines claims predators as "bad actors" that try to unlawfully charge Veterans a fee to "help" them file VA benefits claims.

VA urges Veterans to use only VA accredited representatives and released a claims predators toolkit for stakeholders to support amplification.

The public facing communication toolkit contains a frequently asked questions document, a claims predators infographic/flyer, four Native American infographics for different regions (arid, great plains, snow covered, and tropical), and a PowerPoint presentation for external audiences. A link to this toolkit was included in your read ahead material.

## **Expanded Access for Benefits for K2 Veterans and Survivors**

On August 9, 2024, VA announced several steps to <u>expand access to VA benefits for Veterans who served at Karshi-Khanabad (K2)</u> base in Uzbekistan after Sept. 11, 2001, as well as their survivors. These steps include:

- Making chronic multi-symptom illness a presumptive condition for K2 Veterans;
- Recognition of exposures at K2 as "toxic exposure risk activities" (TERAs);
- Ensuring that Military Environmental Exposures are fully taken into account when processing K2 Veterans' claims;
- Pre-decisional review of K2 claims.

Importantly, in addition to these steps, all Veterans who served at K2 and meet basic eligibility requirements are already eligible to enroll in VA health care to get world-class, low-cost care for all their health conditions – without needing to apply for disability

compensation first. These Veterans are also eligible for presumptive benefits for the more than 300 conditions covered by the PACT Act.

Moving forward, VA will continue to evaluate additional ways to support K2 Veterans and their survivors. VA encourages all Veterans who served at K2 to apply for VA care and benefits by visiting VA.gov or calling 1-800-MYVA411.
